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ADVANCED and HIGHER EDUCATION ()

With its vision to become the center of excellence among institutions of higher learning, Jose Rizal Memorial State University (JRMSU) is dynamically and consciously applying for various strategies and techniques to cope with the ever changing demands of the society and to maintain its excellent performance in academic endeavor. It is a big challenge for the University to accommodate the needs of Zamboanga del Norte and neighboring provinces by providing competent graduates capable of embarking development to their working places.

The University, with the capacity to provide quality and relevant higher and advanced education in various fields, offers 3 doctorate degree programs, 19 master's degree programs, 50 bachelor's degree programs, 10 non-degree programs, 15 short-term courses and corporate high school. Advanced education programs are on the fields of education, public administration and management, rural development, health and nursing, arts and sciences, criminology, technological and vocational education and agriculture courses. On the other hand, higher education focuses on the fields of engineering, arts and sciences, criminology, industrial and information technology, teacher education, agriculture, forestry and fishery, maritime education, tourism, hotel and restaurant management, nursing and allied health sciences, public and business administration, commerce and accountancy, law, nontraditional courses and other relevant fields of study.

To ensure quality and responsive education that is comparable to the national and international standards, curricular programs of the University have been submitted for accreditation through the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP) and International Standardization Organization (ISO) 9001: 2008 for the College of Maritime Education courses. Technical-vocational courses have been also given National Certificate (NC) II by the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority. In the entire University system there are 31 AACCUP accredited programs, 2 ISO accredited programs, and 15 TESDA accredited technical-vocational courses.

The fact that students in the University have diversities on skills and interests, addressing their needs require and attending much competence on the part of instructors / professors. In order to uphold quality and excellence in service delivery, the University has fervently and unwaveringly provided opportunities for its faculty to be abreast of their fields by attending conferences, seminars and trainings and enrolling in studies. 305 Faculty attended seminars and learning among the students. The kind of learning atmosphere they established and proper teaching methods and techniques they applied are dependent upon their capacity to understand and recognize each student performance level. And one of the best ways to achieve teaching with excellence is through faculty development programs in terms of seminar-workshops, conferences, for a, trainings and etc. There were over 300 faculty who attended over 193 regional, national and intentional seminars, trainings and conferences.

Faculty Accomplishment

After years of showing exemplary performance and earning achievements for the University, two instructors of Jose Memorial State University (JRMSU) reaped the fruits of their hard labor as they were awarded Faculty Meritorious Awardees of 2013 during the Employees' Fellowship Night held at the University Gymnasium on December 18, 2013.

Dr. Leonardo Cainta, Research Coordinator and Assistant Professor III of Dipolog Campus and Mr. Paterno S. Baguinat III of the Main Campus received the prestigious awards.

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Mr. Baguinat, 24, became the youngest instructor to have conferred such award. He was a Diamond Awardee (First Place) during th

e 2011 Asian Award for Oral Presentation. He was also the winning coach of students who won Mathematics, Journalism, Rizal and History and General Information Quizzes.

Meanwhile, Dr. Cainta was a member of Alliance of Dreamers and Leaders for Excellence (ADLE). He was also the Best Oral Research Presenter during the training workshop on Enabling Policies, Programs and Best Practices in Research and Publication compliance to CHED Typology.

JRMSU also recognized outstanding extension worker and researcher. Dr. Jannette J. Icao, Assistant Dean of the College of Business and Accountancy (CBA) – Main Campus was awarded Best Faculty Researcher while Prof. Grace Abad, Assistant Dean of the College of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences (CNAHS) was adjudged Best Faculty Extension Worker.

Based from the information collected, Dr. Icao is presently the lead researcher of the Worldfish-Economy and Environment Program for Southeast Asia (EEPSEA) project in Region IX. Aside from this, Dr. Icao is also an active participant in various seminars and trainings like the Citizens Satisfaction Index System (CSIS) funded by Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), and the AAS Gender Strategy Orientation and AAS Stakeholders Consultation Workshop funded by Worldfish.

Prof. Abad, on the other hand, pioneered CNAHS extension program whose main concern is to bring health care closer to people, and led various programs in leadership and management, self awareness, maternal and child health, communicable and noncommunicable diseases, income generation, herbal medicines, environmental sanitation and other services such as fire fighting, tree planting, Pantawid program information dissemination, and clean/safe water supply.

The faculty's instructional performance, teaching experience, participation in various school activities and extension projects, and achievements acquired were among the factors being considered in giving the said award.

Dr. Edgar S. Balbuena, University President was an Education Leadership Awardee during the 4th Asia's Best B-School Awards held on July 31, 2013 at Pan Pacific, Singapore.

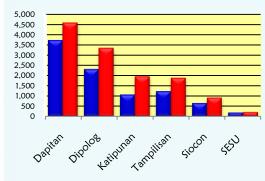


STUDENTS' PROFILE

It can be gleaned in the table that Main Campus has the highest enrolment during the first and second semesters of SY 2013-2014. Sibuco External Studies Unit (SESU) decreased in enrolment during the second semester compared to the previous SY by 7.18%. In general, there was an increased in enrolment compared to the previous SY. Katipunan Campus gained the highest percentage of increase during the first semester while Tampilisan Campus gained the highest increase during the second semester. This general increase in enrolment could be attributed to the increase of institutional, public and private scholarship program. An increasing trust of public and private agencies towards JRMSU can also be seen.

Figure 3 Difference of Student Enrolment between First Semester of SY 2012-2013 and First Semester of SY 2013-2014

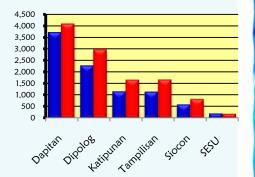




Figure 4 Difference of Student Enrolment between Second Semester of SY 2012-2013 and Second Semester of SY 2013-2014 ADVANCED AND HIGHER EDUCATIO

SCHOLARSHIP GRANTS

The University is committed to offer its quality service to deserving students. During the School Year 2013-2014, government and private agencies trusted the University's capacity of honing students holistically for them to be useful to themselves and to the community. Several scholarships have been granted to worthy students. The University has also taken its part of leading determined and responsible students in the achievement of their desired careers by granting institutional scholarships. 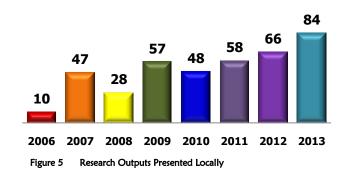

The Threshold, CHED JAS accredited Category A-2 (International Level) This year, the University maintained its outstanding performance in research. The University conducted researches not for the sole purpose of compliance but for the reason of serving the community by disseminating meaningful findings and contributing new knowledge and practices for the development of local, national and international communities. The dissemination of findings is done by presenting research papers during local, national and international conferences where researchers, educators, policy makers, community workers and other interested people convene. These people, who are actively involved in conferences in turn, conducted seminars and trainings for the benefit of the community as a result of newly acquired information and practices in specific fields.

The University has presented 84 researches in local presentations of which 11 researches reached national and 22 reached international conferences. *The Threshold*, a CHED JAS accredited Category A-2 research journal also published 16 full researches.



To strengthen the culture of research in the University, each college is mandated to conduct at least one research every semester. The researches have been funded by the college and the institution. The college researches are funded by the college itself. On the other hand, institutional researches are funded by the Research GAA fund of the entire University.

ON-GOING AND FUNDED RESEARCHES

JRMSU is on its third year as implementer of the Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (BFAR) Aquasilviculture project. It aims to ensure resource sustainability, attain food security and alleviate poverty among Filipinos who are known to depend on the country's coastal resources. The Ministry of National Education, Directorate General of Higher Education, Indonesia still partnered JRMSU on the research related to giant clams. 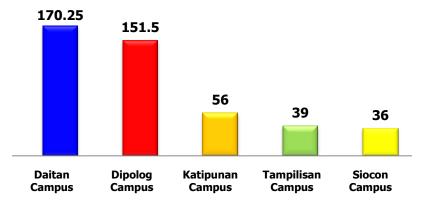
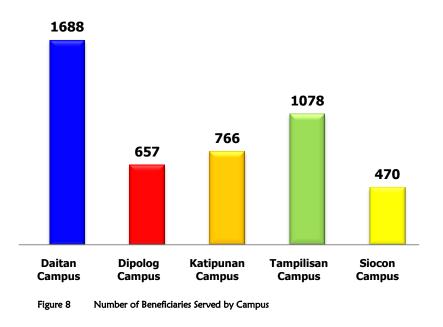
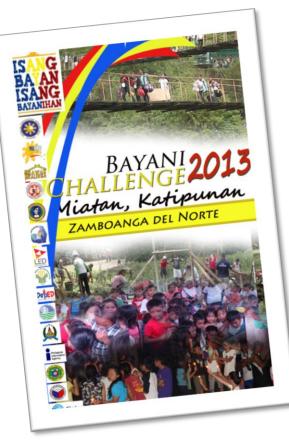


Figure 7 Number of Days Rendered by Campus

PRODUCHHON

To augment the budget allocation of government for higher education, the Commission on Higher Education has encouraged State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) to engage in income generating projects (IGPs). In response, Dr. Edgar S. Balbuena, JRMSU University President, challenged the five (5) campuses of the University to maximize their available resource for sustainable IGPs. He also persuaded researchers to make researches for commercialization as another means of increasing the University's income.

Income generating projects has been beneficial for a long time to the University in cases where it's a necessity to source out fund from other reliable sources aside from the subsidy of the government to realize instructional and physical development; to expand and strengthen research and extension undertakings and to wage; and to compensate contract laborers. Likewise, IGPs serve as hands-on trainings for students to make connections between theories learned in school e.g. those with agricultural courses where fields are laboratories for crop productions; and enhance entrepreneurial skills of those with business related courses.

INCOME GENERATING PROJECT (IGP)

Each campus is adopting strategies and applying entrepreneurial abilities to efficiently derive higher income from its resources. In the Main Campus, IGPs focused on students' system uniform, t-shirts, faculty uniform, sardine production, water refilling station, kiosk, guest house rental and toga rental. Dipolog Campus on the other hand, has only two IGPs namely, cafeteria, water refilling station, rent of gymnasium, metal work service, and catering service. Siocon Campus obtained its income from rice production, bangus and fry production, academic gown rental and system uniform. Katipunan Campus has IGPs focusing on dormitory and function hall rentals, rice, vegetables and fruit production, poultry and livestock raising, piggery, dairy products, food processing, and catering services,

Through the linkages of Tampilisan Campus with different NGOs and GOs as lead agencies for rice production and vermi-composting projects (vermicast/vermitea) has provided venues for IGPs capabilities towards the production of rice seeds and organic fertilizers in commercial level. Aside from this new project, the campus has maintained its income from bamboo, cattle/dairy project, ZREC, fruit trees, vegetable nursery, piggery project, poultry project, rubber production, rice production, sheep, computer printing, coconut project, sand and gravel/quarry, chicken multiplier farm, hito/tilapia production, and vermi culture.

Without the administrative staff performing their functions, the University could not successfully accomplish its objectives in its four-fold functions – instruction, research, extension and production. As for this reason, the University, with its intention to develop the capabilities of its manpower for effective service delivery, is providing the administrative staff with applicable seminars and trainings. The following are the seminars and trainings actively attended by the administrative staff.

There are about 112 administrative staff sent to over 69 seminars, conferences and trainings on PhilGEPS, government procurement, Civil Rules, PAGBA, GAD, DOLE programs, frontline services, PBB, agriculture, management practices, and others related to the administrative functions.

STUDENT AFFAIRS AND SERVICES

Student Affairs and Services are non – academic services, programs and activities designed to facilitate holistic development through various experiential learning activities and to create an environment conducive to the total development of students, (CHED Memo 21 S. 2006).

This School Year 2013-2014, Student Affairs and Services office of the University has actively extended its assistance and services to its students. The office initiated quality, relevant, efficient and effective services and programs which unraveled and honed students' skills and abilities recognizing the diversity of their needs. Through the concerned Deans of the office, problems and issues pertaining to students' rights and concerns especially on intellectual, cultural, social and physical atmosphere in the campuses have been addressed carefully and intelligently. The University believed that students themselves are resources. Thus, the office has also provided them the opportunity to become collaborators of programs and services for the welfare of their fellow students. As a result, the figure below shows the percentage of students and personnel who rated the non-academic services (e.g. Library services, medical/dental services, guidance services, ICT services, etc) as good or better.

It can be gleaned from the figure that Dipolog Campus has the highest student satisfaction. In general, JRMSU System has an average of 94.39% (1st Semester - 12,148/12,707 and 2nd Semester - 10,198/10,944) students who rated its non-academic services as good or better.

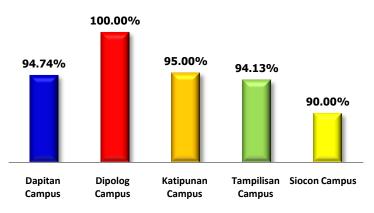


Figure 9 Percentage of Students and Personnel Who Rated the Non-Academic Services as Good or Better

The campus' cafeteria provides nutritious and affordable variety of foods for lunch and snacks for student, instructors and staff.

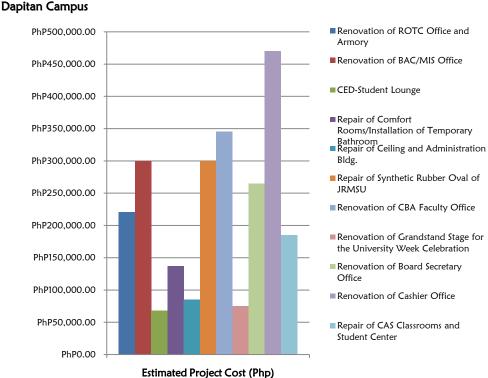
The cafeteria in-charged has always looked into the sanitation and safety of the food preparation, the cleanliness of the surroundings and even the orderliness in serving the diners.

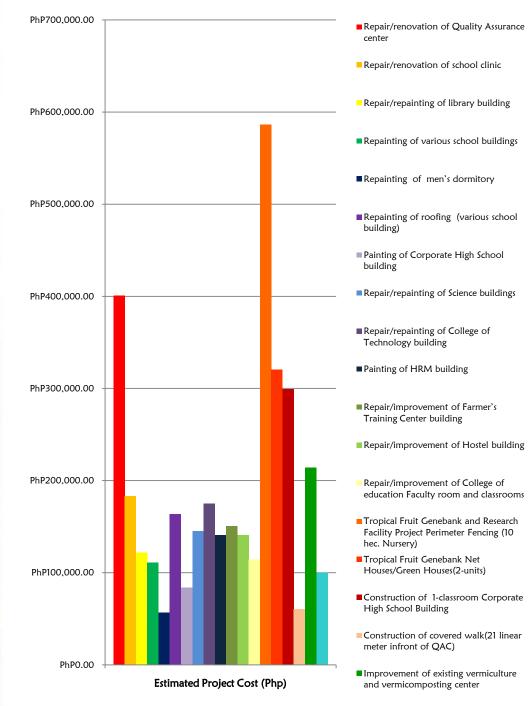

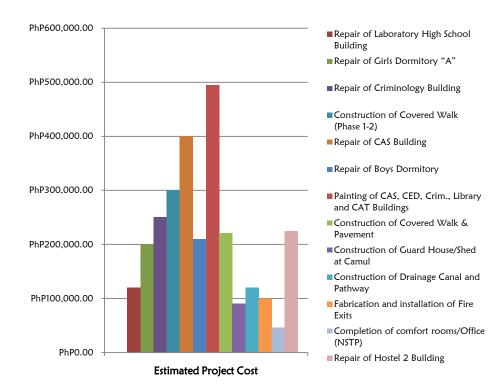


Figure 12 List of Projects Implemented and Their Estimated Cost (Tampilisan Campus)
